



Wellness and Reablement

Although wellness, reablement and restorative approaches are emerging as powerful ways to help older people improve their function, independence and quality of life, they are not new concepts in aged care. In Australia, Victoria and Western Australia are already operating with a wellness focus embedded in their programs and services.

The concepts and principles of wellness, reablement and restorative care will need to be taken and moulded to suit the individual circumstances of clients and service settings. Although wellness and related concepts are already used widely in the aged care sector, for many providers their adoption will represent a significant change from the way entry level care services have previously been delivered. This involves a shift from a service delivery model that may have fostered dependence to one that actively promotes independence and supports people to remain living in their own homes and the community for as long as they can manage and wish to do so.



It supports clients to be independent in their homes and to continue to actively participate in their communities for as long as they wish to do SO.

GOVERNMENT ESTABLISHES 2024 DRY SEASON TASKFORCE

Cook Labor Government

The Cook Government has announced it will establish a 2024 Dry Season Taskforce to help address concerns as farmers across Western Australia experience challenging seasonal conditions.

The taskforce will share information and identify ways in which the agriculture industry, in collaboration with Government, can support farm businesses and rural communities during current dry season challenges, which are expected to become the 'new normal' due to climate change.

In particular, the taskforce will consider:

- o access and availability of fodder for livestock;
- o access and availability of water for livestock and cropping operations;
- o extension and adoption of drought resilient practices across different farming systems;
- o opportunities for collaboration and co-ordination of industry, local and State Government activities: and
- provision of evidence-based information and tools to support on-farm decision making processes.

The taskforce will be chaired by Wheatbelt Development Commission Chief Executive Officer Rob Cossart, who also led the emergency response to the Kimberley floods, in his role as State Recovery Coordinator. Other taskforce members will be announced soon.

Agriculture and Food Minister Jackie Jarvis said, "This autumn is already proving to be hotter and drier than previous years across much of the State, and some areas have had no real rain since spring last year. Livestock and horticultural producers are already feeling the brunt of this.

"Climate modelling is indicating we may have a late break to the season across grain growing regions, and I want to ensure Western Australian farmers have all the information they need to support critical on-farm decision making.

"This hot, dry weather is the 'new normal' due to the effects of climate change, and it's absolutely vital we find new ways to tackle these challenges going forward."

The State Government has a range of resources and programs in place to help farmers and regional communities prepare for and manage the impacts of more frequent dry seasons.

PRODUCERS' PERCEPTION OF CARBON FARMING PROGRAMS

We have had a request from a university PhD project from the Australian Federation University, looking into research on what the perceptions of real farmers is on the whole Carbon Farming national program and how it could be better implemented across the board.

"The study aims to understand the farmers' perception of carbon farming, which will help them integrate it into broadacre agriculture. The Ararat Rural City Council, Victoria, funds this research, and the PhD candidate is supported by Federation University Australia and Destination Australia Scholarship."

2024 GRANT APPLICATIONS

LANDSCAPE REHABILITATION

We are looking for potential sites to include in our current State Natural Resource Management (NRM) funding application. We are proposing to include fencing and revegetation as part of the threatened species recovery target the state has set aside.

If you have an area that would have potential links across the landscape (e.g. creekline, fenceline to the road reserve, existing vegetation), we would be keen to hear from you and potentially include your site in our application. These applications are due the 17th of May, and would need a site visit completed well in advance of this date, so get in touch ASAP if you are interested.

DROUGHT RESILIENCE

The other area of interest for application is around dams and making them more efficient.

After a recent field day with Katanning Landcare looking at their different dam management programs, we are keen to look at whether we can apply any of those strategies in our coverage area. Due to the constraints around grant funding, we would largely look at focusing on enhanced dams. We would be keen to hear from anyone who may be interested in applying this strategy to improving the quality and longevity of your dam.

IMPROVING THE EFFICIENCY OF FARM DAMS

Water quality can be just as significant as water quantity for livestock drinking water, spray water and other agricultural uses. The ecosystem services provided by more than 1.76 million dams in Australia can benefit agriculture as well as the environment, and enhance the security of quality water supplies.

ENHANCED DAMS



Works Undertaken at Both Local Trial Sites

- Fencing to exclude livestock
- Installation of a pump to move water from the dam to a stock watering trough outside the fence
- Revegetation around the back and sides (outside the dam bank) with shrubs and trees
- Revegetation with sedges around the waterline within the dam
- Revegetation of the water entry slope above the dam with groundcovers and low shrubs.
- Costs of pumps and troughs varied based on farmers choice, plants cost around \$1 each and standard 7 line fencing was used.



What is an Enhanced Dam?

The term "enhanced dam" has been adopted from the Australian National University's Sustainable Farms Program, and refers to a method of managing a farm dam like a wetland ecosystem to improve both environmental and agricultural outcomes.

Enhanced dams are typically fenced to exclude livestock (or controlled hard access point built), revegetated both around and inside the dam, water points for livestock are located off-dam and water inflows are managed to restrict nutrient and sediment entry.

Katanning Landcare has trialled the established of two Enhanced Dams 2022 - 2024. As the full impact of the system won't be visible for a number of years while vegetation establishes, baseline information has been gathered.

How do enhanced dams improve water security?

- Vegetation surrounding the dam reduces evaporation through shading (lowering water temperatures) and reducing wind exposure on the waters surface, improving retention of water volume.
- Eliminating livestock pugging, and reducing the inflow of sediment improves water clarity, thus reducing temperatures and improving its usability through pumps eg spraving.
- Reducing nutrient and bacteria loads in the water body lengthens its season of use for livestock watering.







RESULTS TO DATE

Temperature, surface area, secchi depth (turbidity), electrical conductivity and pH have been measured at both enhanced dam trial sites, and also a control dam where no enhancement works are taking place.

It is expected that no difference in water quantity or quality results will be observed for a few more years while the vegetation establishes.





E Coli

- E Coli is a bacteria that can found in water contaminated with faecal matter. As well as impacting human health, it can cause reductions in livestock weight gain.
- ANU studies showed that E Coli reductions could be achieved within 6 months of enhanced dam system establishment.
- Our local testing of E Coli also showed significant improvements at Bev's site, following fencing and planting.
- Kristen's dam E Coli levels were above the measurable limit both times, so we cannot ascertain if there was a change.

The climate is drying, we have to be improving our water security, but I want to be able to do it in a way that also helps our environment. The enhanced dam system does that.

DON'T SWEAT IT! YOUR FITNESS JOURNEY IS PROTECTED BY WA LAW

How's that new year fitness resolution going? Maybe the January eagerness to get to the gym has worn off or you're nearing the end of a 12-week fitness challenge and you're feeling the pressure to sign up for another one. The good news is, no matter what you decide to do with your fitness goals, you are protected by Western Australian law when it comes to using fitness service providers.

In July 2021 the rules governing WA's fitness industry changed to provide better protection for consumers. The Fitness Industry Code of Practice applies to providers such as personal trainers, group exercise organisers and yoga classes.

Despite this, we have seen a 33 per cent increase in complaints from 103 in 2022 to 137 in 2023. The vast majority involve disputes over membership cancellations, and payments and refunds.

The Code has been in place for nearly two years. There is no excuse for flouting the rules, so Consumer Protection is putting the fitness industry on notice.

Charging over \$1,000 to cancel membership within the seven-day cooling off period is not what we consider to be reasonably reflective of the administration costs incurred. Using high pressure sales tactics to get people to sign up to expensive '12-week fitness challenges' is breaking the law. Providers cannot make people physically come into the gym to cancel membership contracts. These are just some of the types of complaints Consumer Protection is still seeing.

Consumer Protection has a few training tips for when it comes to engaging a fitness service.

Your membership agreement must include a summary statement to help you understand your responsibilities and it should also state whether it involves an ongoing month-to-month renewal or is a fixed term contract of no longer than 12 months. You must be notified before your membership is automatically renewed.

Should you decide the fitness service is no longer for you, you won't need to arrive in-person to cancel your membership. Cancellations can now be made by email, with direct debits required to stop immediately. High pressure sales tactics and harassment are banned.

After first signing-up, you have up to seven days to cancel your membership and you should only pay for administration costs or services used. If you want to cancel at any point after this seven day period, the most you can be charged on your membership is 30 days after your notice of cancellation.

Take the time to re-assess your new year resolutions and fitness goals. Consumer Protection is your cheer squad.

WHAT YOU NEED TO KNOW BEFORE SHARE HOUSING

Splitting a rental with mates or even people you find through an advert can be a smart way to tackle soaring rent prices and low vacancy rates. But before you start dividing up chores and discussing furniture options, it's important to understand your legal rights and responsibilities when it comes to share house arrangements.

In co-tenancies, there is a shared tenancy agreement, but all tenants are jointly responsible for the full rent amount, bond and condition of the entire property. This means if your house mate misses a rent payment, for example, the whole household could be at risk of breaching the tenancy agreement unless they can cover the outstanding amount.

When it comes to paying the bond, each contributor must be listed against the bond as a tenant. The private landlord or agent then has 14 days to lodge the bond with the Bond Administrator.

Consumer Protection recently had two real estate agencies and directors fined and reprimanded for failing to lodge tenancy bonds within the required timeframe. Renters deserve peace of mind knowing their bonds are being handle by landlords and agents in accordance with the law.

It is important tenants receive an immediate receipt of their payment. The Bond Administrator will also send the tenants and the private landlord/agent a record of the payment directly from the department. This also ensures each tenant is returned their correct share of the bond when the tenancy ends.

If you move out of a share house, negotiate to have your name removed from the tenancy agreement. If you fail to do this, you can still be held responsible for the rent and other obligations. Also ensure you are provided with an outgoing property condition report. If anything needs to be addressed the cost will be recovered from your share of the bond.

Similarly, if you move into a share house ask for the tenancy agreement to be varied to list you as a co-tenant and add your name to the bond. The landlord/agent should provide an up-to-date property condition report. As the new co-tenant, you cannot be held responsible for the condition of the property before you moved in.

We advise only entering into shared tenancy agreements with people you trust and communicate well with. We know this can be difficult to gauge when replying to an ad looking for a house mate, so we recommend putting everything of importance in writing to protect yourself. This may include agreements about how and when rent and bills are paid, responsibility for everyday cleaning and maintenance of the property, ownership of any shared belongings and use of common areas.

If one tenant has paid another tenant's share of rent or other money owed to the landlord, the tenant can apply to the court for an order they be repaid by the other tenant. If you need assistance with money owed by a co-tenant or other similar dispute, reach out to your local community legal centre for more advice.

When everyone decides to move out of a share house the tenancy ends in the typical way.

THE BIG POT OF SOUP

Now that the afternoons are feeling cooler and the nights are becoming dark earlier, it can be the time to think of nourishing, comforting food. Few things fill that spot like a lovely hot pot of soup.

You don't need to wait for someone else to make it for you anymore. I will show you how easy it is. It will be satisfying to sit down to a lovely bowl of your own homemade soup.

I make soup the way my mother makes it: using stock, good meaty bones and lots of vegetables and beans. It's always a little different. I think that makes it such a wonderful meal. Sometimes the beans and lentils will thicken up until the soup is almost like a stew, other times it will be delightfully thin and light. However it turns out, it's always good.

First, I make the stock: Into a large stockpot put four or five good meaty bones. You can use shanks or shin bones or even lamb flaps if your butcher has them. As long as they are nice and meaty they'll be fine.

Add cold water to cover, a large onion cut into quarters, the tops off a bunch of celery and three or four carrots cut into chunks. Bring this to the boil, then turn the heat down and simmer for at least an hour, preferably two. Every now and then skim the foam off the top of the pot. This makes the stock that forms the base of your soup.

When the meat is falling off the bones, your stock is ready. Carefully pour the stock through a colander or strainer into a clean bowl. Go through the colander and pick out the meat and return it to the stock. Now to get the fat from the stock you need to cool it. You can leave it in the fridge overnight or put it in the freezer for half an hour, depending on how much time you have before you want to eat soup!

When the stock is cold the fat will form on the top. You can then just lift if off and put it in the compost.

To make the soup: Measure the stock and return it to the stockpot.

Now add the same amount of cold water. Dice 2 or 3 onions, 2 or 3 carrots, 3 or 4 celery ribs, 1 parsnip and 1 turnip or swede. You can dice the veggies by hand, or put them into the food processor and whizz until they are in even sized pieces.

Add the veggies to the stockpot. Bring to the boil. Once the stock is boiling, add 1½ cups soup mix (the dried lentils and beans available from any supermarket). There are different styles of soup mix – it doesn't matter which one you use, although I like the Italian mix because of the variety of beans.

Stir the soup mix into the stock and bring back to the boil.

Turn the heat down until the soup is at a rolling simmer. By that I mean not boiling so hard it will froth up and boil over, but still bubbling and moving around. The stock needs to be moving to keep the beans and lentils from sticking to the bottom of the pot and burning. Every now and then give it a stir.


I let this cook away for at least 45 minutes, to ensure the soup mix is properly cooked (you don't want hard beans or lentils) and to develop the flavours.

That's it. Once it's cooked, I have a hard time keeping the family out of it. I don't season with salt or pepper until it's served. Sometimes it needs salt, other times it doesn't. I find it best to leave the seasoning until eating so it's not over-salted or too peppery. And if there is any left it goes into the fridge for the next day, when it is even better.

That's all there is to it. Making soup is easy. It's also very frugal and easily makes 15 hearty serves. If you've never tried to make soup, give it a go.


