To nominate candidates are required to lodge with the Returning Officer

- Must complete the online candidate induction from the Department of Local Government, Sport & Cultural Industries website www.dlgsc.wa.gov.au
- A completed nomination on the prescribed form which has been signed and witnessed (forms are available from all local government offices and the WA Electoral Commission).
- A single A4 page profile of the candidate containing not more than 150 words or information about the candidate.
- Where a nomination is lodged on a candidate's behalf by an agent a written authorisation signed by the candidate is required.

The documents may be hand delivered, posted, faxed or sent by other means if available.

Nominations must also be accompanied by a nomination deposit of \$80.00 which must be received by the Returning Officer before the close of nominations.

Hi to all our Wagin Library & Gallery Patrons and friends Is stress good or bad for us?

Stress is something we have or a loved one has had in their life. It might even be ongoing. Stress is the body's way of responding to demand or pressures. It can be caused by both good and bad experiences. In many cases stress is a healthy reaction.

It helps us cope with life's challenges. If you have too much stress, or prolonged stress it can affect our physical and mental health.

These are some of the common signs of stress:

Low energy, headaches, upset stomach, aches, pains and tense muscles, chest pain and rapid heartbeat or even insomnia.

Examples of life stresses can be:

The death of a loved one, divorce, loss of a job, moving to a new home, chronic illness or injury or it could be a combination of things.

There are a few ways to relieve stress.

Exercise, reduce your caffeine intake, write down how you are feeling, laugh at the silliest things, spend time with family and friends, listen to music, meditate, read a book, do a jigsaw puzzle, listen to an audio book or may even like to read to a child. How about watch a very funny comedy movie.

Here are a few books to help with your stress:

"8 keys to stress management" by Elizabeth Anne Scott. Anne Scott is a blogger and a professional. This book is a convenient self-help tool for those looking to manage stress more effectively. It is a resource that may actively work through, then revise later. There is a wealth of information on how to manage it.

"Meditation made simple" by Paula Watkins, Ph.D. Dr Paula Watkins is a clinical psychologist, meditation expert she also holds a PhD in public health and community medicine. In this book there is meditation practices, benefits, and applications.

"Stress less, Accomplish more" by Emily Fletcher. The fifteen minute meditation programme for extraordinary performance. Do this meditation twice a day as recommended. Emily shows an ancient meditation technique, designed for busy lives. The focus of the practice is stress relief, mental clarity and improved productivity, so it's perfect for the fast pace of modern life. This style of meditation will help those with a lot of demands on their time, those with busy jobs, lives and families.

There is a website to contact <u>www.helpguide.org>articles>stress-symptoms-signs-and--causes</u>. Seek medical advice if stress is getting too much. Contact your local doctor or health professional. You might like to try some art activities to help you relax. Would you give drawing or painting a try? You don't have to be a professional to do drawing or art. The painting or drawing could be something you like or you could express how you are feeling.

To help me relax I like to listen to music, do some gardening, exercise, catch up with my family and friends, read when I have some free time, and go to the movies with friends.

Remember, find time to relax so there is less stress.





WINGS OVER WAGIN STATE CHAMPIONSHIP COMPETITION IN SCALE AEROBATICS



Over last weekend, Wagin again played host to the Scale Aerobatic pilots from around Western Australia. Two years ago the airfield was buzzing with the National Championships. "So we thought it was about time to return – it was such a success" says Club President, Peter Bryner.

Since then the airfield has been host to other model aircraft events, being the home of West Jets. "This is a great place for flying. The Shire is supportive, we support the local businesses and the field is one of the best places around for a model aircraft competition. We have stringent CASA guidelines regarding use of a full-size

airfield for models. We had a number of full-size visitors throughout the competition – and it all ran smoothly", Peter continued.

13 model aircraft enthusiasts each underwent nine rounds of competition flying to determine the State Champion for each of the five classes in this discipline. Scale Aerobatics is defined as the use of model aircraft which have a full-size equivalent in aerobatic competition. They are usually larger models than people expect – ranging from 2-3 metre wingspan and around 30-40% scale. "We use the 1000ft clearance to execute loops, stall turns and many trick manoeuvres, just like the full size aircraft."

Six sequences were completed on Saturday by all pilots. The great weather continued into Sunday after a cloudy start. The first round on Sunday was the "unknown". This is a set of manoeuvres which the pilots have never flown before. "It increases the stress level a bit", Peter explained. "But everyone managed without crashing. I'm proud of how everyone handled the challenge."

Then to finish off, another two sequences of the "known" sequence was flown. This can be a challenge because everyone is getting a bit tired. "You have to put that last unknown flight out of your head, back to the regular sequence", Peter said.

Everyone in the competition gets to sit in the judges' tent - "it's important that pilots get to judge others as well as fly – we are not a big enough group to afford separate judges".

Congratulations to all the participants, their helpers, the Shire and West Jets for a successful event. The State Champions for 2019 in Scale aerobatics in each class are:

The Wagin Meals on Wheels service started in 1974 with a small group of volunteers including Mr Mick Divall, the main organiser for many years, Sister Win Malone, and Matron Di Hoad (Di Piesse). One of the original members, Mrs Robin Dunham, is still delivering meals - a wonderful achievement.



On 24th February 1983, this band of volunteers had their first official meeting and decided to be incorporated, mainly to cover insurance purposes.

Mrs Tup Thompson was the original President and held this position until 1988, when Mrs Robin Dunham took on the position. She held this until 2012, then Mrs Val Parker 2012-2017 and Mrs Shelly Benck 2017 to present were elected.

Other positions held were Roster Coordinators Mr Divall from inception until 1995, Mrs Lois Dohle until 2006, V Kelly 2006-2007, Gwen Bosenberg 2007-2012 and W Farrow 2012 until today.

Various Treasurers with Val Parker 1993 to 2003 and Sue Hall 2003 until today.

There are reports of farmers south of Boyup Brook squeezing ice from the stems of faba bean crops, which are usually quite tolerant to frost.

SWCC Regenerative Agriculture Survey Help quide future funding investment

Regenerative farming is a holistic concept that is proposed nationally and internationally to transition agriculture to becoming a truly sustainable industry. The term "regenerative" is more accurate than "sustainable" because the practice regenerates and stabilizes soils, increases biodiversity, captures carbon, improves the water cycle and provides ecosystem services, by reducing or eliminating many conventional/industrial farming practices such as excessive ploughing and the widespread over-use of inorganic fertilisers and pesticides (herbicides, insecticides, fungicides etc.).

Regenerative agriculture is one way in which farmers can remain profitable by ensuring their farm products meet global demands, which is why the State government through the Department of Primary Industries and Resource Development (DPIRD / DAFWA) has started looking into these practices.

The seven regional natural resource management (Landcare) organisations in WA have been funded by StateNRM to conduct this survey to find out what the key barriers are that might stop farmers and others from actually taking up regenerative agriculture. The results will be provided to DPIRD to help guide their future priority research.





BAKED LEMON CHEESECAKE

INGREDIENTS

- 250g plain sweet biscuits
- 150g butter, melted
- 500g cream cheese, softened
- 3/4 cup caster sugar
- 3 teaspoons finely grated lemon rind
- 3 eggs
- 1/4 cup lemon juice
- Icing sugar mixture, to serve
- Double cream, to serve



*** Can add fresh or frozen raspberries into the mix to change it up. (Lightly mix through after beating lemon juice in).

METHOD

Step 1

Preheat oven to 160°C/140°C fan-forced. Grease a 6cm-deep, 20cm round spring form pan. Process biscuits until finely chopped. Add butter. Process until combined. Press mixture over base and side of prepared pan. Refrigerate for 15 minutes.

Step 2


Meanwhile, beat cream cheese, sugar and lemon rind together until smooth. Add eggs, 1 at a time, beating until combined. Add lemon juice. Beat for 1 minute. Pour mixture into prepared pan.

Step 3

Bake for 50 minutes to 1 hour or until filling is just set (mixture may wobble slightly in centre, but will firm on standing). Cool in oven with door slightly ajar. Refrigerate for 4 hours or until cold.

Dust with icing sugar and serve with cream.
