SHIRE PRESIDENT CONDEMNS LIVE SHEEP EXPORT BAN

In a disgraceful turn of events, the Western Australian sheep industry, represented by the iconic Bart the Giant Ram, has been traded away in a shady backroom political deal to win the by-election for the seat of Dunkley.

Under cover of darkness, the Federal Minister orchestrated a deal that equates to trading a cow for three beans. This transaction jeopardises the future of an industry that has diligently met and surpassed all regulatory benchmarks, and contributes significantly to the nation's export revenues.

Bart the Giant Ram, a symbol of pride for our rural communities and recently featured in a special coin release, now faces an uncertain fate.



"There is no point having a Giant Ram in a Rural Community that has no sheep", said the Shire President Phil Blight.

The ramifications of this decision will be felt in households across. Western Australia. Rural communities pride themselves on their resilience meeting the challenges of flood, drought and fire but they will struggle to withstand this attack from politicians in Canberra.

The Shire of Wagin, alongside many regional Western Australian communities, is now faced with an uncertain future, tasked with supporting a rural community that has been deprived of the means to support itself.

The Shire calls on the Commonwealth Government to reverse its decision and to engage in genuine dialogue with Western Australian farmers and agricultural communities.

Preventing Falls: Essential Steps



Taking care of your overall health can significantly reduce your risk of falls and fractures. Here are key steps to prevent falls:

Stay Physically Active: Regular exercise strengthens muscles and improves flexibility. Weight-bearing activities like walking can slow bone loss from osteoporosis.

Balance and Strength Training: Engage in yoga, Pilates, or tai chi to enhance balance and muscle strength. Use weights or resistance bands for additional strength training.

Fall-Proof Your Environment: Regularly test your eyesight and hearing. Wear glasses or hearing aids as prescribed. Be mindful of medication side effects, and avoid excessive alcohol.

Use Assistive Devices: If needed, use canes or walkers to maintain stability. Ensure these devices are properly sized and maintained.

Safety Measures: Be cautious on slippery surfaces, keep hands free, choose non-skid footwear, and avoid going out in bad weather.

Tell your doctor if you have fallen since your last check-up, even if you did not feel pain when you fell. A fall can alert your doctor to a new medical problem or issues that can be corrected. Your doctor may suggest physical therapy, a walking aid, or other steps to help prevent future falls.

Works Update

The towns crew has been busy planting new annuals, keeping our town looking beautiful. 
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Back in the Day: Erection of the first pole in connection with the Wagin Electric Lighting Scheme

The lighting of Wagin performed satisfactorily when the current was turned on. About 35kms of cable was used in the initial installation. The question of commencing operations on a paying basis was one to which the Council had given much thought and the decision was made to install lights in houses and business premises at a price equal to the cost to the Council. Consumers were charged at 12.5% deposit, and the balance was payable in equal instalments over two years, with interest of 5%. The common sense of this approach had been proved by 1915, when there were 72 consumers connected to the mains, the equivalent of about 850 lights, and there were about 50 more consumers waiting to be connected. This system of securing revenue from the beginning was unique and had not previously been tried elsewhere. The Wagin Council disposed of its old streetlamps for \$1.50 each including both the lamp and its post.

FUEL CARD INCREASE – TOO LITTLE TOO LATE

The Nationals WA have welcomed an increase to the Country Age Pension Fuel Card, adding it is long overdue.

Peter Rundle, Member for Roe, has said an increase is welcomed, but more should have been done earlier to assist pensioners living in regional areas.

The Country Age Pension Fuel card was a National Party initiative first introduced in 2009 and funded through Royalties for Regions to recognise the additional travel costs experienced by people living in regional areas.

The card is to be rebadged as the Regional Pensioner Travel Card, though no explanation has been given as to the reason for and cost of the change.

Since Labor came into Government in 2017, the value of the card has not been increased despite the increases in cost-of-living and countless calls from The Nationals WA.

Mr Rundle said, "The Government has been ignoring the pleas of regional pensioners for far too long".

"These are the people who have worked hard all their lives and are finding it increasingly difficult to travel to buy food, attend medical appointments, or visit the bank.

"The State Labor Government continues to pump billions of dollars into Perth's public transport network, which has little or no benefit for regional Western Australians.


"Fares for Perth residents have been capped at two zones and metro passengers enjoyed the summer of free travel between Christmas Eve and 28 January 2024", he added.

"These concessions are not available to residents in the regions, where public transport is strictly limited, taxis are often not available, and fuel is invariably higher.

"The Government has taken seven years to make this commitment, and it is apparent they have finally done so as an election sweetener less than one year out from the polls."

Mr Rundle added The Nationals WA in government would ensure the Regional Pensioner Travel Card increased with the Consumer Price Index to reflect inflationary pressures and the rising cost-of-living.

What drives you to do business in Wagin?


I live in Wagin and love our little town. There is definitely a call for beauty here. Starting off at only two days, within the year my hours have now increased to four days.

DUNE: PART TWO is by far the highest-grossing film of 2024. This is partly because it's one of those movies you've got to see in a cinema. Director and screenwriter Dennis Villeneuve (*Blade Runner 2049, Arrival, Sicario*) unearthed the dusty, epic bones of Frank Herbet's *Dune* novels and rebuilt them into something surprisingly exquisite. This still contains the 1965 story's cynical take on humanity's flaws and the moral dilemma of whether we must make unethical choices in order to secure our future. Yet the unwieldy plot has been trimmed, very respectfully, to give breath to astonishing filmography, strong performances, and a balance of tranquil moments between stunning action set pieces. It's worth watching *Part One* first. Find it on Blu-Ray or DVD; rent from Apple, Prime or YouTube for just \$5; or buy a digital copy.

The Dark Emu Story. Adult fiction DVD. Thought provoking, revelatory and inspiring, telling the story of Bruce Pascoe's Dark Emu. He set out to prove ancient Aboriginal practices of agriculture and construction, showing a sophisticated use of land that predated colonisers.

- The Bricklayer. An adult fiction DVD. A rogue insurgent assassinates foreign journalists and frames the CIA. Coaxed out of retirement to clear the agency's name, a deadly operative must confront his checkered past, while unravelling an international conspiracy.

 Hug a Bug: How You Can Help Protect Insects by Bonnie Worth. A junior non-fiction book.
 Dr. Seuss' Lorax teaches you about insects. Illustrated with bright, cheerful art and full colour photographs. The Lorax introduces children to nine insects currently endangered by human activity. Insects are vital to earth, and many are threatened with extinction.
- Smile by Lauren Child. This is a junior fiction book. Get ready to laugh out loud with a funny and exciting new book. Recommended for children aged 7 to 11. TAKE BACK YOUR PHONE FROM TELEMARKETERS AND SPAM

Unwanted calls and spam SMS can be a source of frustration. Whether it's persistent telemarketers interrupting your dinner or irrelevant promotional texts flooding your phone, there are ways to put a stop to them.

You may have forgotten about the Do Not Call register, which is a free service run by the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA). You can register your home, personal mobile or fax number online via <u>donotcall.gov.au</u> or call 1300 792 958. The good news is you only need to register once.

Telemarketers then have 30 days to stop contact. The Do Not Call Register legislation applies to Australian telemarketers, businesses within Australia that use overseas-based telemarketers, and businesses based overseas making calls to Australian numbers.

The register works by requiring telemarketers to submit a list of phone numbers they wish to call to the Register Operator. The Register identifies any numbers that are not permitted to be called and they are removed from calling lists.

Keep in mind research or survey related calls are not telemarketing, so you may still receive these, as well as calls from registered political parties, politicians, government agencies, election candidates, registered charities or educational institutions where you are or were a student. These are all exempt. However, there are still rules to be followed.

Telemarketers can only call between 9am-8pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturdays and never on Sundays. Researchers can call 9am-8.30pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturday and Sundays. Neither can call on a national public holiday.

The caller must tell you their name, the name of their employer and why they are calling and their caller ID must not be blocked. They also must end the call if you ask them to.

Unfortunately scam calls won't stop after registration. A legitimate caller should not mind if you want to verify their identity. You should never give an unsolicited caller any personal or financial information, including credit card details, or access to your computer.

Receiving an SMS about a sale from your favourite clothing store is helpful but when do 'helpful' texts turn into unwanted spam?

Marketing texts must also follow rules set out by ACMA. The business needs to have your consent, for example you ticked 'subscribe' on a form or entered a competition, include contact details and offer a way for you to unsubscribe or opt-out.

After you unsubscribe or opt-out, the business must generally stop sending marketing texts within five days.

You can report spam messages to ACMA by forwarding the message to their dedicated SMS line – 0429 999 888, or you can report it online via ACMA's spam complaint form. Also consider blocking the number on your phone. ACMA does take action, and most recently issued penalties of over \$3.7 million to Luxottica (Sunglass Hut, Oakley, OPSM), Uber Australia, Kmart Australia and Ticketek for breaches of spam rules.

And just like with unsolicited calls, you may still receive text messages during elections or from registered charities and other Government bodies.

NAVIGATING RENTING WHEN DISASTER STRIKES

West Aussies are no strangers to disasters such as bushfires, storms and floods. But if you're renting, there might be the extra stress of working with your landlord should your residence be affected by a catastrophe.

The good news is when it comes to rentals, both landlords and tenants have rights and responsibilities should a property become damaged or destroyed in a disaster such as a cyclone or bushfire.

If your house has been destroyed or deemed by the Local Government to be unfit to live in, the most practical approach is for the tenant or landlord to give a notice of intention to immediately end the lease. Tenants can give two days' notice, while the landlord must give seven days. Whichever way, a landlord should finalise the tenancy and repay the bond in the normal way, minus any mutually agreed expenses incurred by the landlord. The landlord doesn't have to provide alternative accommodation.

Following damage to a rental home, the landlord is legally responsible for necessary repairs and maintenance to bring the property back to a liveable condition. If a tenant continues to be able to live in the rental, urgent repairs required to essential services such as power, gas, water including supply of hot water, and sewage should be arranged within 24 hours. If any other issues could cause someone harm or undue hardship, or cause further damage then works need to be arranged within 48 hours.

With urgent repairs, if you cannot reach the landlord or if within 24 hours, the landlord fails to act, then you can employ a suitably qualified repairer to fix the issue to the minimum standard. Please be aware that there may be delays – it can be difficult to get tradespeople to your home as many properties may need repair after a disaster.

When services to an entire area have been impaired – such as when power poles burn down or the water supply becomes compromised – it can take the authorities some time to resolve the issues, but the landlord could consider providing a generator, potable water or if not, then a rent rebate for the duration. In these cases, Consumer Protection can assist the parties to reach a mutual agreement.

When it comes to debris, emergency services may already have a cleaning program in place, so contact the local authorities, such as the emergency services for advice.

It's also smart to be wary of travelling conmen or unlicensed traders who can target areas after a disaster going door-to-door, offering cheap cash-only deals.



Find Bowel Cancer Early



Living a healthy and fulfilling life is important to us all. But ignoring our health and not seeing a doctor if we have unusual symptoms could have a serious impact on our life and wellbeing. It is important to be aware of cancer symptoms and get checked out by a doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker if you notice anything unusual.

Did you know?

Bowel cancer is one of the most common cancers affecting both women and men in Western Australia. Unfortunately, in 2019, more than 1,300 Western Australians were diagnosed with bowel cancer, and just over 400 people lost their lives from the disease. So, it is important to be aware of the common bowel cancer symptoms and to visit your doctor if you have any concerns. If it is bowel cancer, the earlier it's found, the greater the chance of successful treatment.

Common symptoms of bowel cancer include:

- blood in your poo (even just one time)
- for more than four weeks:
 - a new pain, lump or swelling in your tummy
 - feeling tired, looking pale, losing weight without trying
 - a change in normal bowel habits such as runny poo, pooing more often or finding it hard to poo.

If you have noticed unusual tell your doctor, clinic nurse or Aboriginal health worker without delay. It doesn't mean you've got bowel cancer – often these symptoms turn out to be something less serious, but it's important to tell your health professional and get checked out to be safe.
