

### 55-YEAR SERVICE MEDAL AWARDED FOR KEN TURNOR

Wagin Volunteer Fire and Rescue Service held our monthly meeting on the night of 9<sup>th</sup> July and before the meeting began, we had a special presentation.

The Brigade invited Joyce Turnor to the Wagin Fire Station, for Department of Fire and Emergency Services Superintendent Craig Smith to present her with an award for her late husband Ken 'Pud' Turnor. The fourth clasp for the National Medal is for 55 years of service to the Wagin Fire Brigade. It is an award which recognises long and diligent service in organisations which protect life and property at some risk to their members. This is exactly what Pud did, and even in the later years when he was no longer able to attend incidents, he was still known to show up at the station and lend a hand however he could.

Joyce said Ken loved the brigade and much of his time revolved around it. Some of the senior members reminisced on the fact Ken was Captain when they first joined the brigade. They said he made a big impact on the brigade in those years, teaching them some very important skills. Pud is greatly missed and is still spoken about often in the brigade.

### **WAGIN HISTORICAL VILLAGE**

July 2024: "On out trip to WAGIN we went to this Village as there is not much else going on in Winter and we were glad we did. We were the only ones there so we took out time and had a good look around dodging the rain. Plenty to see and for history buffs its a great look into WAGIN of old. Cafe wasnt open but it was still good." [sic]

This is a quote from the website Tripadvisor about our Village. Would you like to be a part of the army of volunteers who maintain and grow this valuable icon in Wagin? This quote alone shows the appeal the Village has, but we know it could be better. An earlier quote says:



April 2023: "Located inside the Wagin Showgrounds, off Ballagin Road is a unique interactive social history museum. Open seven days a week between 10am and 4pm - entry \$10/adult; \$8/seniors & \$5/children.

It is reconstruction of a the local farming community, comprising 25 original and replica buildings from the region's past. The buildings include a schoolhouse, stone church, fire station, bank, blacksmith, shearing shed, printers, community hall, general store, barber, bootmakers and dressmakers.

It is run by local volunteers and the buildings are relatively ecliptic, mostly modern designed to be older, which does take away from the authenticity of the few original structures. The interiors of the buildings however contain a great collection of historic equipment and memorabilia that gives you an insight into the region's heritage. Some of it however is crammed into small spaces - could do with a proper curator to set it out in an easier viewable display.

It does have a tea room [which was closed when we visited] that apparently does tea, coffee, scones, sandwiches and cakes but as it is volunteer run is not open all the time." [sic]

If maintaining and growing this marvellous asset to our town is something you feel you can be part of, come along to the AGM on 14<sup>th</sup> August at 4pm in the Village Tearooms and learn how you can contribute. Membership to be a voting member is \$15 and can be paid on or before the day.

The Wagin Historical Society is also still looking for community contribution to the best use possible for the new big shed, which will enhance the story of Wagin's history that is told at the Wagin Historical Village.

### **WEST FAMILY HISTORY**

### Jim West

The following speech was delivered at Wagin Historical Village on WA Day 2024.

Good morning, distinguished guests, and greetings to all for WA Day.

It is an honour to be invited to talk today about our early West Family history.

The original Sam West (Christopher Samuel) left Kyneton, Victoria to join his brother John Thomas (often known as JT West) on the Kalgoorlie goldfields in about 1899 aged 17 years. His father Christopher gave him £20 for his sea journey.

JT West left Kalgoorlie about a year later looking for good farmland, which took him to Ballaying, East of Wagin.

Sam had given up goldmining in Kalgoorlie and was selling books for his income. For a school project I once asked if he found much gold and his words were, "There was a lot of holes between each piece of gold, so I sold books, as every literate miner wanted something to read at night".

I still have one of his ledgers of sale written in a beautiful copper plate.

JT then telegraphed Sam suggesting that he join him at Ballaying as there was excellent farmland available. Sam then caught a train to Perth bought a horse and sulky, 12g shotgun, .22 rifle and as much of the paraphernalia needed to camp and develop a farm as he could. Then after a three-day, two-night stint, he arrived to join JT at the place we now call Sam's Camp between Balgun and Harcourt.

He soon selected land next to JT and went about development of some first-class farmland.

Soon after, his two other brothers also came to Wagin. They were Frank (father of Ken West) and his brother Jim. All continued the hard work of developing their farms, all in the Ballaying area. His sister Margaret married a William Height who also came and farmed at Height Road Ballaying.

Sam married Alice Cronin in 1906, the daughter of John Cronin and Eliza McKenna, thus linking our family to two of the early settlers of Dumbleyung and Wedgecarrup. The wedding was celebrated on the 11<sup>th</sup> of August 1906 at Bunkin, the Cronin homestead. This was a dual wedding where Minnie Bairstow married James Cronin on that same day.

John Cronin was a protestant (he helped build the Wagin Catholic church). Granny Eliza Cronin was a strong Roman Catholic so when my grandpa Sam went to ask for Alice's hand one Sunday, Granny was not pleased. Grandpa Cronin let her carry on for a long time whilst she prepared Sunday lunch but, eventually, he banged his walking stick on the ground and said, "Where else in these parts will Cissie (Alice) find such a fine partner". Thus, the marriage came to be celebrated at the Cronin family home in 1906.

JT and Sam split partnership around this time. Sam's sister Elizabeth (Bessie) married George Cronin, tying the two families together even more.

Sam and Alice had the Prospect home (now Balgun) built by Wagin builders WE Hanke & Co for the princely sum of £69-10-0 with 10-6d for extras. When buying fixtures for this new house, they joined with JT West who was also expanding Harcourt homestead then. All of these fixtures are the same in the original parts of Balgun as in part of Harcourt. By the brick bond it seems part of Harcourt was built at the same time by same builders WE Hanke & Co.

Sam came from a dairy farm near Kyneton and he was only familiar with the butchering of cattle. When learning to butcher a sheep he had to rely on his wife Alice or Cis as she was generally known to teach him the finer points of slaughtering and butchering sheep. She had helped with this from a young age.

As Sam C. S. continued with his farming, many well-known families were involved. One family that helped with the shearing, was always done by the extremely hard-working Billy English who farmed

along the Collanilling Creek. Bill was known to arrive and shear by the light of a hurricane lamp occasionally. He also built and made the homestead larger as the family expanded.

Another who worked for Sam was Charlie Cross, who became the MLA for Canning representing the Labor Party. Correspondence continued between Sam and Charles for many years, with Sam often pointing out some of the problems in the bush and Charles asking about them. It would help if this could happen today.

Sam contributed to the community for many years. He was a member of the Wagin Roads Board for 31 years. He, with my other grandfather Jim Murdoch and good friend Phil Toll, helped to start the foundation of the Wagin Co-operative which is still very much in existence.

Education was highly prized by Sam and Cis. Most of the children spent some time at boarding school in Perth although the great depression cut it short for some of the kids. My father Cliff excelled in sport at school. I still have a magnificent gold medal of his for being the Guildford Grammar School champion gymnast 1926. After leaving school Cliff put on many gymnastic displays when requested.

Most of the West brothers contributed to their communities. JT West was a very active local government member after moving to Dumbleyung. Much of this is mentioned in the Dumbleyung history books. JT West was awarded an MBE for being the first growing wheat with great success at Harcourt, Ballaying. JT was a regular correspondent to the Wagin Argus and was known for being very straight talking. Jim West and JT were the early owners of the Sunshine harvester agency in Dumbleyung.

Jim West went to World War I as a 10<sup>th</sup> Light Horseman and was present at the first and unofficial surrender at Damascus. I have a Christmas card written from Syria to Grandma. On return he took up land in Kondinin and became a very prominent citizen, in local government, building and owning machinery agencies and shops that were much needed. The West buildings can still be seen in Kondinin.

The other West to serve during WWI was Sylvester Robert West known as Bob West, JT West's son. Bob fought in France and at the age of 18 won the Military Medal.

Our Irish connection is strong. Sam's father came from Brookeborough, Fermanagh. In 2011 Linda and I visited Ireland and the Irish relatives who still farm the original farm that Christopher was raised on before emigrating to Australia. On investigation it would seem Bob West may have visited on leave during the last days of WWI. We also have been to the town of Youghal from which the Cronin family shipped out to Western Australia. Youghal is a beautiful walled town and the magnificent church dates back to around the 900s.

I haven't found exactly where they came from but, to quote Clem Cronin on a trip to Cork, he went to a pub in a small village nearby, bought a drink, asked if there were any Cronins around about; the whole pub stood up!

I will finish with a story about duck shooting at Gundaring Lake, which was an extremely popular place to get a feed of ducks about a week before Christmas. Grandpa Sam was at the Cattle Station on his horse, going to see if all was well with the duck shooters. As he cantered through metre high wild oats, suddenly a gentleman stood up directly in front of him, who was stark staring naked. Grandpa enquired why he was in that state of undress. The gent replied in a polished accent, "Sunbaking, but you won't tell anyone about it will you?" Grandpa Sam replied that his secret was safe with him. As the shooters were leaving, Sam thought that the gent in the wild oats was driving away in a Rolls Royce. A few years later Sam needed a haemorrhoid operation, so Dr Baker referred him to a surgeon in Perth. When he met the surgeon lo and behold it was the naked sunbaker. After consultation planning for the surgery the surgeon stated, "And there will be no charge".

To this day no one other that my grandfather Sam knows the surgeon's name.

Balgun and Harcourt are now being farmed by Sam and Jenny, the fourth generation of Wests to farm this magnificent patch of country.

### STAY SAFE THIS WINTER

The cooler weather has finally arrived and this usually means staying warm by using products like heaters, wheat/heat packs, hot water bottles and electric blankets, or even sitting near a cosy fire.

Consumer Protection is reminding people there are safety risks with many winter products. If not careful, they could pose a fire hazard to your home. Winter is also a time to be aware of mould in the home, as well as the safety of children's clothing, which can be flammable.

Smoke alarms are our first line of defence against fires. It's vital the batteries are replaced annually, they are regularly tested, and alarms more than 10 years old are replaced.

Simple precautions such as checking for recalls on all products, following safety guidelines, and being vigilant about safety can go a long way in protecting your family and home.

Children are particularly vulnerable to burns and accidents, so it is crucial to keep them away from open flames and heaters. Their pyjamas and dressing gowns can be highly flammable so check the mandatory fire labelling to determine the fire risk rating. Also avoid loose fitting sleepwear and be cautious of PJs bought online that may not comply with Australian mandatory safety standards.

Gas heaters should be serviced by a licensed gas fitter at least every two years, or annually if the equipment is more than 10 years old. The gas fitter can check for issues such as blockages, overheating or burner problems or inadequate ventilation in the room. Never bring outdoor heaters inside the house.

If you are the kind of person who loves heating up their bed before jumping in, there are also some things to consider. Check your electric blanket for damage to cords and wires, always turn it off before going to sleep and avoid placing objects on your bed while it's on.

Use hot tap water, not boiling water, to fill up your hot water bottle and consider buying a new one every year as they can hide damage internally. Allow a heat or wheat pack to cool before reheating it and chuck it out it if you smell burning.

Condensation that builds up on walls/windows can lead to mould and cause nasty health problems. Open windows each day to ventilate your home and scrub mould off hard surfaces using soapy water or vinegar. It must be physically removed to prevent regrowth.

Lastly, store matches and lighters in a safe place, out of reach of children and never leave them alone with any open flame like a fireplace or even candles.

By being proactive and making safety a top priority we can all enjoy a warm and cosy winter season free of harm this year.

### TAX TIME SCAMS - DON'T FALL FOR THE PHISHING BAIT

While you might be smart enough to get your tax return in early, no one is too smart to be scammed.

Consumer Protection is warning Western Australians to be alert to tax scams, which are most prevalent around this time of year. And they're easy to fall for because you're already expecting communication from Australian Taxation Office (ATO) or myGov about your tax.

Last financial year there were 43 reports of tax-related scams to Consumer Protection's ScamNet team, with cybercriminals often using hyperlinks in SMS and email phishing attempts. According to the ATO, people aged 25-34 are most often the victims.

These scams encourage people to click on a link that directs them to a fake myGov or ATO sign-in page designed to steal their username and password, or personal details.

Scammers are also getting crafty, sometimes even embedding fake messages into genuine text chains making their scam almost identical to the real deal.

As a scam preventative measure, the ATO announced earlier this year it was removing all hyperlinks from their SMS messages.

Phrases such as 'You are due to receive an ATO Direct refund' or 'You have a new message in your myGov inbox – click here to view' are commonly used to lure victims in.

Once a scammer has access to the account, they can make fraudulent lodgements in the victim's name and change bank details so that any payments are redirected to the scammers' account.

myGov will never use email, text message, or direct message on social media to ask someone to click on a link to sign in, enter bank details, provide identity documents or provide other personal details.

Robo-calls or calls from people pretending to be from the ATO are also still happening. Callers ask for urgent payment of a tax debt or say they need to fix personal information to process your tax refund. ATO will never use pre-recorded messages, threaten immediate arrest nor demand payment through unusual means like gift cards or cryptocurrency.

Consumer Protection urges people to 'practice the pause' before responding to any emails, texts or calls no matter how genuine they might seem and especially if that contact is asking your personal information. Never send your personal or financial information to someone you don't know or trust.

The best way to protect yourself if you receive one of these emails or SMS messages is to delete it and if you want to access ATO online services, always type my.gov.au or ato.gov.au into your internet browser yourself. Do not rely on contact information given in emails and texts.

If you are unsure if a call you have received is a scam, contact the ATO on 1800 008 540 or myGov on 132 307.

If something seems suspicious, visit ato.gov.au/scams to verify or report. There are examples of the latest ATO Impersonation scams so you can learn how to spot and report a scam.

Sadly, lots of blokes don't have their blood pressure (BP) checked because we don't visit our GP for check-ups and/or the GP has not done a blood pressure test. In fact, a lot of blokes don't know what the blood pressure readings mean and have never had it explained to them.

High BP is one of the 3 main risk factors for heart attack and the main risk factor for stroke. Having a consistently high BP isn't a good thing and may become more common as we age. High BP isn't inevitable, nor unmanageable if we have it, but controlling high BP is critical in protecting our long-term health and wellbeing.

Our bodies contain about 5 litres of blood which the heart pumps continuously around an intricate network of blood vessels. This process delivers vital nutrients and fresh oxygen to our body's tissues and organs whilst creating a certain amount of pressure inside our arteries (blood vessels that take blood away from the heart and out to the body).

Our blood pressure depends primarily on two things:

- The amount of blood pumped by the heart and
- How easily the blood can flow through the arteries.

Blood pressure readings are given in millimetres of mercury (mmHg) and consist of 2 numbers:

- The top number measures the pressure in your arteries when your heart pumps – systolic (sys-tol-ik) pressure;
- The bottom number measures the pressure in your arteries when your heart relaxes diastolic (di-as-tol-ik) pressure.

What is normal blood pressure? According to the Australian Health Foundation there is no normal or ideal blood pressure reading. The following figures should only be used as a guide.

Normal	Less than 120/80				
High/Normal	Between 120/80 and 140/90				
High	Equal to or more than 140/90				
Very High	Equal to or more than 180/110				

(Source - Heart Foundation Managing High Blood Pressure)

The cause of high BP quite often is a mystery. It can be linked to genetics (family history is important), poor diet, being overweight and/or lack of exercise. The effects of some medicines being used to treat varying health conditions can also be a factor along with underlying health disorders that we may have.

The harm of high BP over time is simple. It can overload both the heart and blood vessels which in turn make us more susceptible to heart attack and stroke.

There are many things that we can do to keep our blood pressure healthy. To help manage high BP many people need medicine but by making the following healthy lifestyle changes blood pressure can be lowered:

- Be a non-smoker
- Lose excess weight
- Eat less fat and salt
- Exercise regularly
- Keep alcohol intake down

It is possible to have high BP for years without knowing it, which is why it's called a silent killer and is most often discovered during routine physical examinations. Remember, be proactive and make an appointment for a service visit with your GP and always have BP on your checklist for your GP to check.









### **REGIONAL WA 15'S WAFL CARNIVAL WITH SOUTH FREMANTLE RAMS**



When Ray passed away in 2021 the local football scene lost a wonderful contributor. He was always on hand to share his knowledge and would always help when and where he could.



If you see B Grade coach Blake Davies carted away in the back of a paddy wagon, there is a very good reason. 
